The Viking Age sword or Carolingian sword is the type of sword prevalent in Western and Northern Europe during the Early Middle Ages. The Viking Age or Carolingian-era sword developed in the 8th century from the Merovingian sword and during the 11th to 12th century in turn gave rise to the knightly sword of the Romanesque period.

The most comprehensive study done to date regarding sword blades from the Viking Age has been carried out by Geibig and is discussed in English by Jones in Ian Peirce's Swords of the Viking Age. Geibig has broken the sword types down into 5 types. Type 1: parallel edged to minimally tapering blade with short tip, 600-800AD Type 1 blades date to the period before the Viking Age commonly referred to as the Migration period.

Including both the hilt and the blade, Viking swords were typically around 90 cm long. [8] [9] Scabbards were made of wood or leather, and were often lined with wool or fabric. [10] Especially fine and unique swords sometimes had names, such as Brynjubitr ( Old Norse "Mail-biter") or Gullinhjalti ("Golden-hilt"). [11]

(viciarg / CC BY-SA 3.0) The length of the blade was most often between 70 and 90 centimeters (26 and 35 inches), and they were sometimes inscribed with decorations, or names of the bearer or the forger.

The Viking Age sword was for single-handed use to be combined with a shield, with a double edged blade length of up to 90 cm. Its shape was still very much based on the Roman spatha with a tight grip, long deep fuller and no pronounced cross-guard. It was not exclusive to the Vikings, but rather was used throughout Europe

Swords in the Viking age were typically double edged; both edges of the blade were sharp. Swords were generally used single handed, since the other hand was busy holding the shield. Blades ranged from 60 to 90cm (24-36 in) long, although 70-80cm was typical. Late in the Viking era, blades became as long as 100cm

A number of Viking Age (7) and later medieval (33) swords are included in this broad collection which also includes rapiers, small swords, and even a few polearms and firearms. This collection has largely been absorbed into the National Museum of Denmark .

In the Viking Age a number of different types of weapons were used: swords, axes, bows and arrows, lances and spears. The Vikings also used various aids to protect themselves in combat: shields, helmets and chain mail. The weapons that Vikings possessed depended on their economic capacity. Whereas swords were the costly weapons of the elite, axes and lances were affordable to the warriors of the broader population.

The sword was one of the most important weapons in the Viking Age together with ax and spear. Viking swords are found throughout Scandinavia, but the majority counting about 3500 have been found in Norway. The reason is that the pagan burial customs of putting swords into graves were more common in Norway than in Sweden and Denmark.

We are familiar with Viking swords from various burials, which mainly date to the early Viking period. It was most often people of high status who were buried with swords in the Viking Age. Not all Viking warriors had a sword; they were prestige weapons. Swords were highly valued objects and could be handed down from generation to generation.
